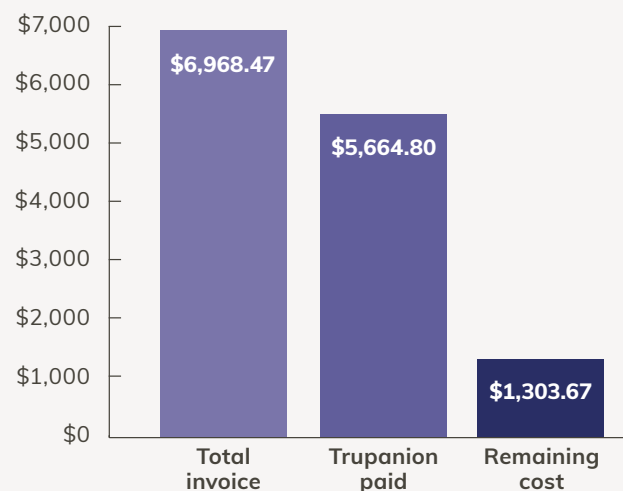

Talk with your veterinarian about your puppy's specific needs, including their vaccine and checkup schedule. In the meantime, there are key behaviors and developmental milestones to watch for as your puppy grows.

 DEVELOP	Birth to 4 weeks	Behavior to look for
 PREPARE	4 weeks to 3 months <p>At around two to four weeks, puppies' eyes open and baby teeth break out. They also start developing sharp hearing and a keen sense of smell.</p> <p>By eight weeks, your puppy will likely be ready to go home. They have developed a more inhibited bite, as well as newfound physical coordination. They may show signs of fear, so give them positive training.</p>	Behavior to look for <p>At this stage, puppy behavior is most influenced by their mother and littermates. They begin to stand, walk, and run. Adult sleeping patterns and social interactions also start developing.</p> <p>Your puppy will have learned some socialization skills, but be patient as they develop further. Now's a great time to discuss the best puppy food, feeding schedule, and training tips. It's also time to get pet medical insurance if you haven't already.</p> <p>ACTION: Take your pup to the vet!</p>
 SOCIALIZE	3 to 6 months <p>As your puppy starts teething, they'll feel the instinct to chew a lot to relieve the irritation in their gums. Provide plenty of acceptable chew toys to prevent unwanted munching on household items.</p>	Behavior to look for <p>Your puppy will have learned some socialization skills, but be patient as they develop further. Now's a great time to discuss the best puppy food, feeding schedule, and training tips. It's also time to get pet medical insurance if you haven't already.</p> <p>ACTION: Take your pup to the vet!</p>
 GROW	6 to 12 months <p>As your puppy starts teething, they'll feel the instinct to chew a lot to relieve the irritation in their gums. Provide plenty of acceptable chew toys to prevent unwanted munching on household items.</p> <p>Both male and female puppies start becoming more confident and adventurous. They will also develop signs of maturity, but different breeds can reach adulthood at different intervals. Check in with your veterinarian to keep your pup on the right track.</p>	Behavior to look for <p>At four months, your puppy may experience a fearful stage as they socialize more and learn their place in the pack. Your puppy may also become more territorial. Continue positive training, and they'll outgrow this behavior in no time!</p> <p>ACTION: Start puppy training!</p> <p>Expect your pup to continue testing or reinforcing their status in the household. It's important to keep them active and engaged at this time and promote healthy behaviors.</p> <p>ACTION: Talk to your veterinarian!</p>



Winter Safety Tips for Dogs

Simple advice for a worry-free winter with your pup.

Even a fur coat needs a coat

Since puppies and short-haired dog breeds tend to be more vulnerable in cold temperatures, consider protecting them with a dog coat or sweater that covers their back and underside. As for breeds with longer hair, allowing their coat to grow out can help keep them warmer this time of year. You may still want to consider a light coat or sweater for particularly cold outings.

Adapt to a winter diet

Dogs naturally burn more calories in the winter cold to keep warm. If your dog exercises outdoors a lot, consider increasing their food or treat intake accordingly. But be careful — too much can lead to potentially dangerous weight gain. Always consult with your veterinarian about a healthy diet for your pet.

Protect those paws

Cold snow and ice can be a pain in the paw. When you're out on walks, keep an eye out for snow and encrusted ice that can cause cracked, bleeding paws. Petroleum jelly is a safe way to protect pet paws, as are dog boots. Always clean off your dog's feet and do an inspection when they're back indoors. If you spot any bleeding or signs of injury, call your veterinarian.

Remove winter pet clothing right after coming back indoors to prevent overheating.

Treats should make up only 5-10% of your dog's diet. Some healthy snacks include carrots, zucchini, and broccoli.

Steer clear of troublesome toxins

Salt and chemical de-icers are commonly used during the winter, but unfortunately these substances are poisonous to pets. Try to avoid contact with de-icers when outside with your dog. Once back inside, wipe them down with a wet towel and then completely dry them off to remove any possible chemicals. Look for pet-friendly de-icers and antifreeze if you need to use them.

Leave the flakes to the snow

Dogs can get dry, flaky skin in winter just like humans do. Use a humidifier and provide plenty of drinking water in your home — your pal's skin will thank you. Bathe your pup less frequently this time of year, and always make sure they are completely dried off after baths. Brushing their coat stimulates blood circulation and can help improve their overall skin condition.

Chilling in the car

Just like when it's hot out, never leave dogs in your car when temperatures are cold. Your vehicle can act like a refrigerator and quickly plunge to dangerous, frigid chill levels when parked. When in doubt, leave your dog at home if there's a risk you'll have to leave them unattended in the car.

Hibernation location

Your dog's sleeping preferences might change as the weather gets colder. They may look to different locations for warmth, which can depend on the weather, their coat type, and how warm you keep your home in cold months. Provide your pet with safe options for sleeping so they can adjust based on their needs.

Winter can be a time to thrive

When it's not too cold out for you, your dog can get some outdoor aerobic exercise that will help keep them healthy. Walking in wooded areas (not covered in snow) is a good way to protect against chilly wind gusts. However, if it's too cold for exercise outside, consider indoor options. Winter is a great time to look into obedience classes and indoor training, like agility and flyball. Other indoor exercise includes tug-of-war, fetch, or a playdate with another furry friend.

Breeds like Alaskan Malamutes and Siberian Huskies have thick, double coats that insulate well against cold weather.

Fish oil can improve your pet's coat and skin — ask your veterinarian about adding this supplement to your pet's diet.
